God Bless Arlan R. Christ The First quilt: The process of quilting shows up in early Egypt and Feudal clothing. No one really knows who used that process the first time but the oldest quilt still around is the *Tristin Quilt* at the Victoria and Albert Museum in London, England

The Tristan Quilt, sometimes called the Tristan and Isolde Quilt or the Guicciardini Quilt, is one of the earliest surviving quilts in the world. Depicting scenes from the story of Tristan and Isolde, an influential romance and tragedy, it was made in Sicily during the second half of the 14th century (1360-1400). There are at least two sections of the quilt, one of which is displayed in the Victoria and Albert Museum's Medieval and Renaissance Galleries, and the other in the Bargello in Florence. A third quilt, also depicting Tristan and Isolde, but not thought to be part of the V&A and Bargello examples, is held in private hands. The Tristan Quilts are the only known surviving examples of medieval guilts. Exerted from Lebanon Quilters Guild March newsletter.


Free Items:

It would be helpful at the end of each meeting if everyone would please place their chair back at the table before you leave. Also make sure that all refuse from refreshments is put in the trash.



Programs

April 19, 2017 A Harvest of Quilts

Michele McLaughlin and Beth Bacher have agreed to bring their new trunk show developed in 2016 called a Harvest of Quilts to our April meeting. The trunk show contains over 30 heirloom quilts featuring or inspired by nature and gardening. Just as gardeners treasure heirloom seeds, they love sharing their heirloom textiles! Let's celebrate spring's arrival with this beautiful trunk show.



May 17, 2017 With a Mother's Love"

Barb Garrett will present a program titled, "With a Mother's Love". She will have a trunk show of doll guilts. From the popularity of her lecture and the quilts themselves, "With a Mother's Love" is now evolving to also become a design and publishing company of the patterns for these guilts. The collection presently includes patterns for thirteen of the guilts used in the presentation. Each pattern reflects quilt-making traditions practiced throughout U.S. history and includes historical information about the specific quilt. August Workshop - Thread Painting with Robin Phillips

August 16th 10am

Cost: \$45 - Practice supplies will be provided.

Supplies needed: sewing machine capable of dropping feed dogs with a hopping or darning foot or free motion foot, fabric panel you would like to enhance with thread, batting, heavyweight cutaway stabilizer, backing, thread to match panel colors. Robin will supply a a quilt sandwich to practice techniques before working on your fabric.

ReUse and Recycle: How to use up random size pieces of batting

Created by Marti Mitchell and carried by Denise at IN STITCHES. You can use this tape to secure random pieces of batting together to make whatever size you need. Great for small quilts like DVI. It is not necessary to sew them which makes the process a lot quicker. You just iron it over the two pieces butted together. It can also be used to stabilize bias edges. It works wonderfully and is a permanent bond. It also needles very well. Il 30 yds \$10

August Challenge

The challenge will be due at the August picnic dinner. The theme is Kitchen. The project must be quilted and identifiable as kitchen. It may be any size. More information will be forth coming.

St. Joseph's Hospital is requesting monitor bags approx. 4½"x6". Cut fabric 14" x 5"". Fold in half and surge (sew) up the 2 sides. Hem the top 1/2" down, put 27" cut strap into hem 2 1/4" apart and then top stitch in place. Twill tape for the strap will be provided.

Guild Pins:

Directions for laundry bags

One yard of masculine or solid sturdy fabric (prewashed). Cut off 6" x width of fabric for cord casing. Cut this in half (about 20-22"), hem the short ends, Fold the 30" x 42" fabric in half (30x21) and sew the seam and bottom edge. (This is like a pillow case) Sew the 2 casings to the top. **Cord will be provided by the guild.**

These are lap size, very tactile, washable quilts in subdued colors that are calming/comforting for Alzheimer patients, nursing home residents, children with ADD and others in similar circumstances. Many examples of these "Fidget Quilts" can be found online on Pinterest. These will be made at the July Community Service night meeting.

Quilters" Rights

A quilter has the right to buy quilting supplies that aren't really needed.

A quilter has the right to use their fabric without pre-washing it.

A quilter has the right to expect that their son will marry a quilter.

2017 Mystery Quilt

March – Clue 3

Divide the 93 strip sets into 3 piles of 31 sets. Now grab that extra pile of 31 medium/dark 2 1/2" x 8 1/2" rectangles in baggie B.



Now, you will be chain stitching your sets together. Take the first 2 sets of 31 and place them with right sides together matching a medium/dark and light end. Stitch a 1/4" seam along the edge. Chain stitch all 31 sets. Now, take the third set of 31 and the medium/dark pile of 31 strips from baggie B and place them with right sides together matching a medium/dark and light end. Stitch a 1/4" seam along the edge. Chain stitch all 31 sets. Clip your threads and press all of your strips towards the medium/dark print.



And now, you guessed it. Take the 2 strip sets you just created. Place them with right sides together matching a medium/dark and light end. Stitch a 1/4" seam along the edge. Chain stitch all the strips to make a total of 31 sets. Press the seams towards the medium/dark print.







Snails Trail - May BOTM

Finished Block measures 12"x12" (12 ½"x12 ½" unfinished)
Use white on white and Apple red print.






1. From each fabric, cut **one** 7 1/4 inch square and cut each square diagonally **twice** to form 8 quarter-square triangles--four from each color, will use 2 each in step 5. From each fabric, cut one 6 7/8 in square and cut in half diagonally once, will use in step 6. From each fabric, cut one 3 7/8 in square and cut in half diagonally once, will use in step 3.



2. Cut two 2 5/8 inch squares from each fabric.



3. Sew the two white and two red squares into a four-patch square for the center using a 1/4-inch seam allowance.



4. Sew the smaller half-square triangles to the sides of the four-patch. Start by sewing the red triangles the sides with a red square to the left of a white square. Sew the white triangles to the opposite sides. Measures 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in square.



5. Using the quarter-square triangles, attach them to the block created in step 4 in a similar fashion. Start with the red triangles sewn to the sides with a small red triangle to the left of a small white triangle. Sew the white triangles to the opposite sides. Finally, sew the largest triangles to the block in the same way. Again, start with the red triangles sewn to the the sides with a red triangle to the left of a white triangle. Measures 9 in square.

6. Sew the largest triangles to the block in the same way as previous steps. Block will measure 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ in square.
